My main research interests are nutrition, metabolism and protein turnover in sepsis. I have co-authored 21 Original Articles published in peer-reviewed journals, 20 letters and Case Reports and over 30 published abstracts. I have been invited to speak as a guest lecturer in the United States of America, Europe, Taiwan, Korea, Singapore and China.

Recently, I have taken on a leadership role in the organ and tissue donation sector in New South Wales, and have published in this area.

## **Biography**

Michael O'Leary is former President of the Australian & New Zealand Intensive Care Society and a Senior Specialist in Intensive Care in Sydney. He is Clinical Associate Professor at Sydney Medical School, The University of Sydney, and Co-State Medical Director of the New South Wales Organ and Tissue Donation Service.

Michael trained in anaesthesia in the United Kingdom and holds Fellowship of the Royal College of Anaesthetists (FRCA). His intensive care training commenced in the UK in Cambridge and continued in Sydney where he achieved Fellowship of the College of Intensive Care Medicine of Australia and New Zealand (FCICM).

Michael was a Research Fellow at St Bartholomew's Hospital, London, UK where he completed his MD degree with studies into the metabolic response to sepsis and use of glutamine and growth hormone in the amelioration of catabolism. Michael continues to have an active interest in the fields of nutrition, metabolism and sepsis in critical illness, however for the past few years has been principally involved with the organ and tissue donation program in NSW.

Michael has previously served as a member of the ESICM Council and the Council of the Global Sepsis Alliance, and is a current member of the Council of the Asia-Pacific Association of Critical Care Medicine.
